It is hard to believe that the holidays are here again. Didn't we just take down the wreaths and pack the decorations away? Yet it is time to deck those halls once more. How I wish I had a few little elves to help me!

Before leaving town for Thanksgiving, I spent several hours in my garden and in the surrounding woods gathering materials to use in my holiday decorating. I find special joy in discovering what remains in the garden which can be worked into holiday arrangements. Silky blue-gray lamb's ears, red and gold Himalayan border jewel and red twig dogwood branches are some of my favorites. From the woods, I've brought in several baskets of pinecones and three wheelbarrows full of Douglas fir and Colorado blue spruce branches to make swags for light fixtures and arrangements for both indoors and out. Aside from these staples, I never know what natural treasures

I will bring back home. This year my bounty included a bird's nest and an antler. The gnarled branches of mountain mahogany also caught my eye even though I am not quite sure what to do with them. Perhaps my very favorite plant to use in holiday decorating is bearberry or kinnikinnik with its diminutive shiny foliage and its tiny red berries. At this time of year, some of the foliage has turned varying shades of red which serves to make it look even more seasonal. Because this native ground-cover grows in long runners, it can easily be fashioned into wreaths and garland or small sprigs can be tucked in anywhere you would normally use holly or boxwood.

One of the major objectives of my walk in the woods was to select this year's tree. It is now marked with red ribbon for my husband to chop down and haul to the house on his trusty tractor. After several years of having a tree which was just too large for us to handle, I have agreed to a twelve-foot maximum height. (Although I may need to also cut down a smaller tree for the overflow ornaments.)

Boughs of Evergreen: The Holidays Approach

It's almost time to start decorating with boughs of evergreen. Which brings us to what the holidays really means. Here in Colorado we're blessed with lots of blue skies throughout the year, but many places aren't. And trimming a house with evergreens during the holidays is all about appeasing the sun so that it will return.

A woman living in Sweden shares that her life sure goes inward during the winter. No light. No wonder people living in those cold, northern climes of Scandinavia and Germany revere plants that stay green year round. Word is the early people believed evergreens stored the power of the sun.

Sheryl Ann Karas, author of "The Solstice Evergreen," says mid-winter marked the year's turning point for our ancestors', people whose only world was the natural environment. Survival then was based on noticing the interdependence of everything around them.

Karas, a Jewish woman who became fascinated with the Christmas tree, researched cultures all over the world and found most festivities included boughs of evergreens. From sprigs to branches to entire trees, evergreens represent the never-ending cycle of the natural world everywhere.

And at some point when the wreath was created, its round shape further symbolized the on-going cycles in the natural world.

Mistletoe is another Christmas greenery, and kissing under a sprig in a doorway is an old Scandinavian custom. When enemies met under mistletoe in the forest, they would lay down their weapons and maintain a truce until the next day. And the Druid's medicinal lore says that mistletoe produces fertility.

This time of year is indeed a time to honor green.

They specialize in two growing seasons per year, a spring/summer season of 6" geraniums, 4" annuals and 12" hanging baskets and a fall/winter season of poinsettias, winter wreaths and bulbs. The retail store is open the second week in April for the annual sales and November 17th at 9a.m. for the fall/winter season. They offer a 10% discount on pre buy orders in April. All merchandise purchased at this time will be held until the final frost date which is usually Memorial Day Weekend.

2006-2007 Blossoms of Light

Denver Botanic Gardens turns into a winter wonderland as it is blanketed in dazzling holiday lights which highlight the natural beauty of the Gardens. Over one million colorful lights draped in elegant designs will illuminate the plants and hardscapes throughout a new path at the Gardens. A variety of entertainment will be held each evening in the All-America Selections Garden outdoor heated tent, Mitchell Hall and also strolling around the Gardens. See the sparkling lights magically transformed into shimmering snowflakes through the lenses of our 3-D HoloSpex glasses.

Many new features have been added to this year's spectacle, including waterlily sculptures that will illuminate the Monet Garden Horseshoe Pool. Additionally, some of the 26 sculptures from the Living Bronze Sculptures by Robert Wick exhibit will be lighted and will incorporate elaborate seasonal plantings. Light Emitting Diode (LED) lighting will be introduced to the display this year, with energy-saving displays in the Water-Smart Garden and Woodland Mosaic, highlighting the Gardens' commitment to conservation and sustainability. LED lights use 80% less energy than normal lights.

Indoors in Gates Garden Court, a captivating display of seasonal plants will be on display. Piping hot beverages will accompany savory snack offerings. There will be several food stations located throughout the Gardens. The Gardens' Conservatory will be closed during Blossoms of Light.
